WVA awarded \$4,859 for the development of a community-based website

The Wolgan Valley Association received \$4,859 from Lithgow City Council under <u>the</u> <u>Bushfire Recovery Community Grants Pro-</u> <u>gram</u>.We were one of ten community organisations including Mingaan Wiradjuri that received funding from the Federal Government's National Bushfire Recovery Agency and Resilience NSW through its Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund. Mayor Ray Thompson said that applications were rigorously assessed and took into account the disaster recovery criteria of •community need;

• impact or benefit to the community;

• community connectedness and;

• capacity of groups to deliver.

He added that many groups doing fantastic work submitted applications and choosing successful projects was very difficult. Kristie Kearney's hard work on the grant application was essential to our success.

The Wolgan Valley Connecting Community Project will see the development of a community-based website that will provide important information regarding natural disaster preparedness, and in the event of a natural disaster provide critical information that will assist the community in making informed decisions regarding the protection of life and property. In addition, the website will showcase the unique natural environment and significant cultural heritage of Wolgan Valley to an estimated 10,000+ annual visitors to Wolgan Valley, whilst encouraging sustainable and responsible tourism practices that are strongly valued by the community. The website will also highlight the objects and role of the Wolgan Valley Association and provide community-based information for residents and property holders in Wolgan Valley including the village of Newnes and the surrounding areas of Wolgan Gap, Maiyingu Marragu, Long Swamp and Angus Place.

Two tiered grant process to clear greenwaste and bushfire damaged trees

Lithgow Council and the EPA are offering grants to quantify the amount of greenwaste that was generated during the 2019/20 bushfires on public and private land. Once an area is assessed there may be the possibility to access further grants that would enable the clearing and disposal of stockpiled greenwaste or fire damaged trees that are posing a significant risk to public safety. Update Bushfire Local Economic Recovery (BLER) Fund

More than 650 grant applications were received requesting over \$1.6 billion in funding which is more than six times the available total funding of \$250 million. We have been informed that due to the high demand it is likely that many applicants will miss out on the funding. Successful applicants will be informed from late June 2021.


